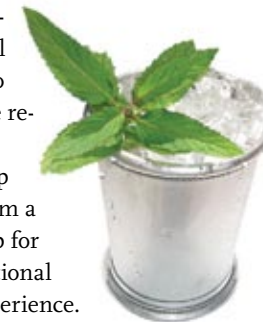

It may be the most frequently sung song ever, and it was born in Louisville. Two sisters wrote the song "Good Morning To All" in a Louisville classroom in 1893, and years later, the words were changed to "**Happy Birthday To You.**"

The **Hot Brown**, an open-faced turkey, bacon, and pimiento sandwich, originated in the Brown Hotel's kitchen in 1926. Chef Fred Schmidt created the hearty snack for late-night partyers at the hotel.



As the official cocktail of the Kentucky Derby, the **mint julep** is required drinking — at least once — for race attendees. Not able to make it to the race? A mint-infused simple syrup, combined with crushed ice and bourbon, is all it takes to make the refreshing drink. Sip yours from a silver cup for the traditional julep experience.
